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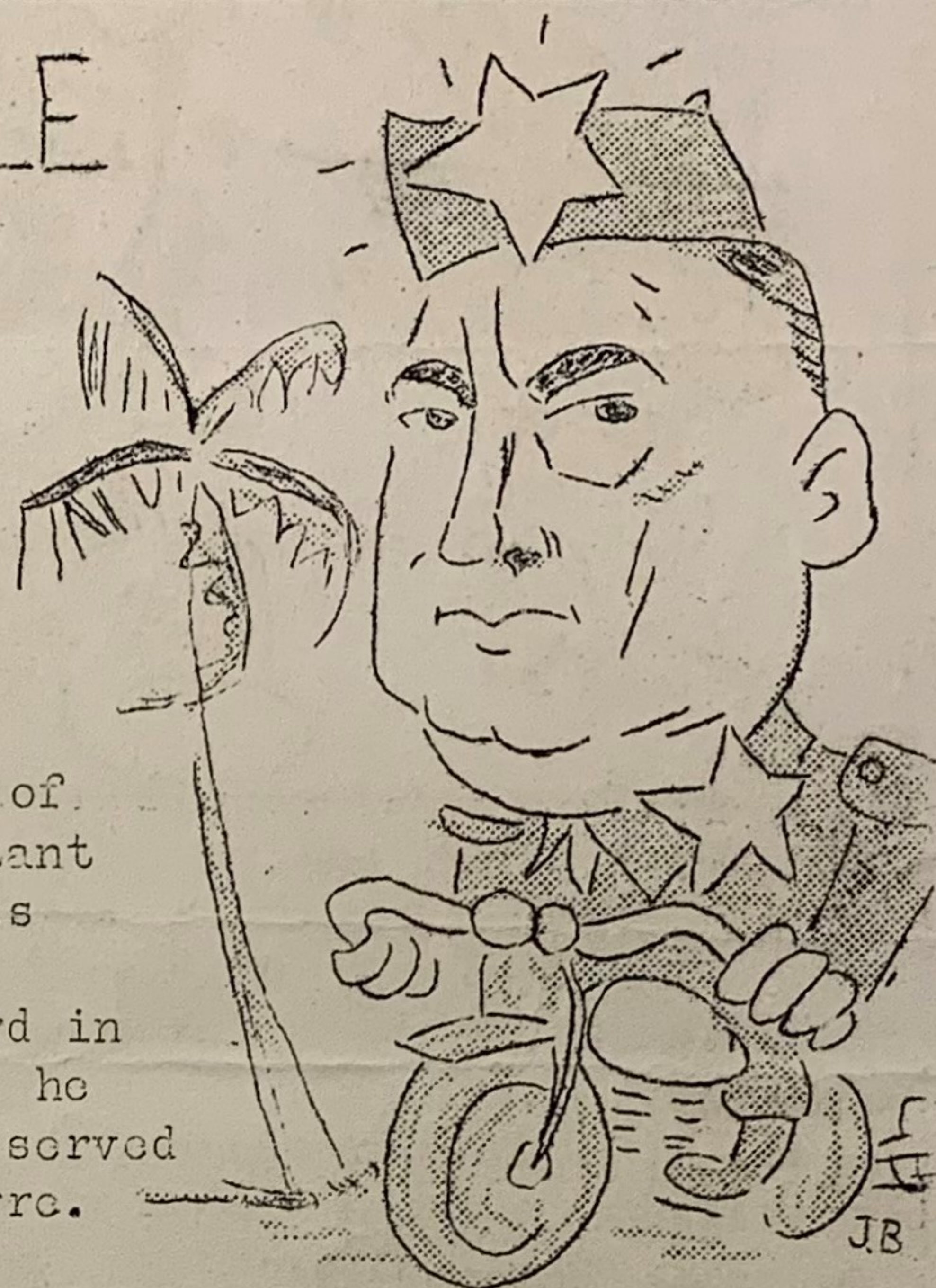

GEN. PERRINE WITH MOBILE FORCE IN PUERTO RICO

Brig. Gen. Nat S. Perrine of Fort Worth & Austin, Texas, former commanding officer of the 141st Infantry, has been assigned to the Puerto Rican Mobile Force, headquarters of the Army's Puerto Rican Department announced recently.

Soon after his appointment as one-star general on August 17, 1942, the Texan left this division for Puerto Rico. He was succeeded as commanding officer of the 141st Inf. by Lt. Col. Richard J. Werner, assistant chief of staff, G-3, who formerly commanded companies "B" and "F" of the regiment.

General Perrine enlisted in the Texas National Guard in 1915. In 1917, after service on the Mexican border, he was assigned to the 142d Inf., in which regiment he served 23 years. World War awards include the Croix de Guerre.

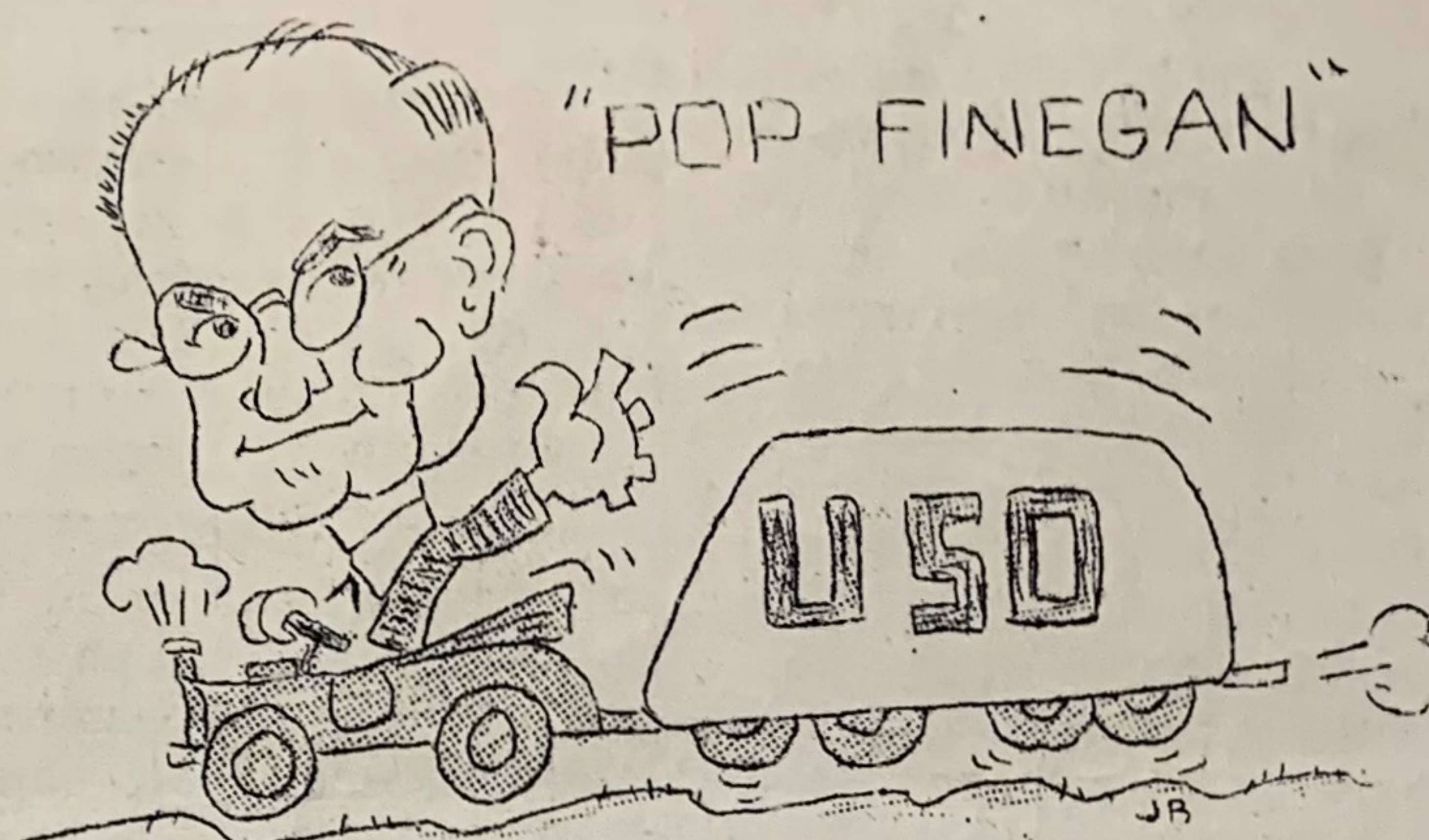

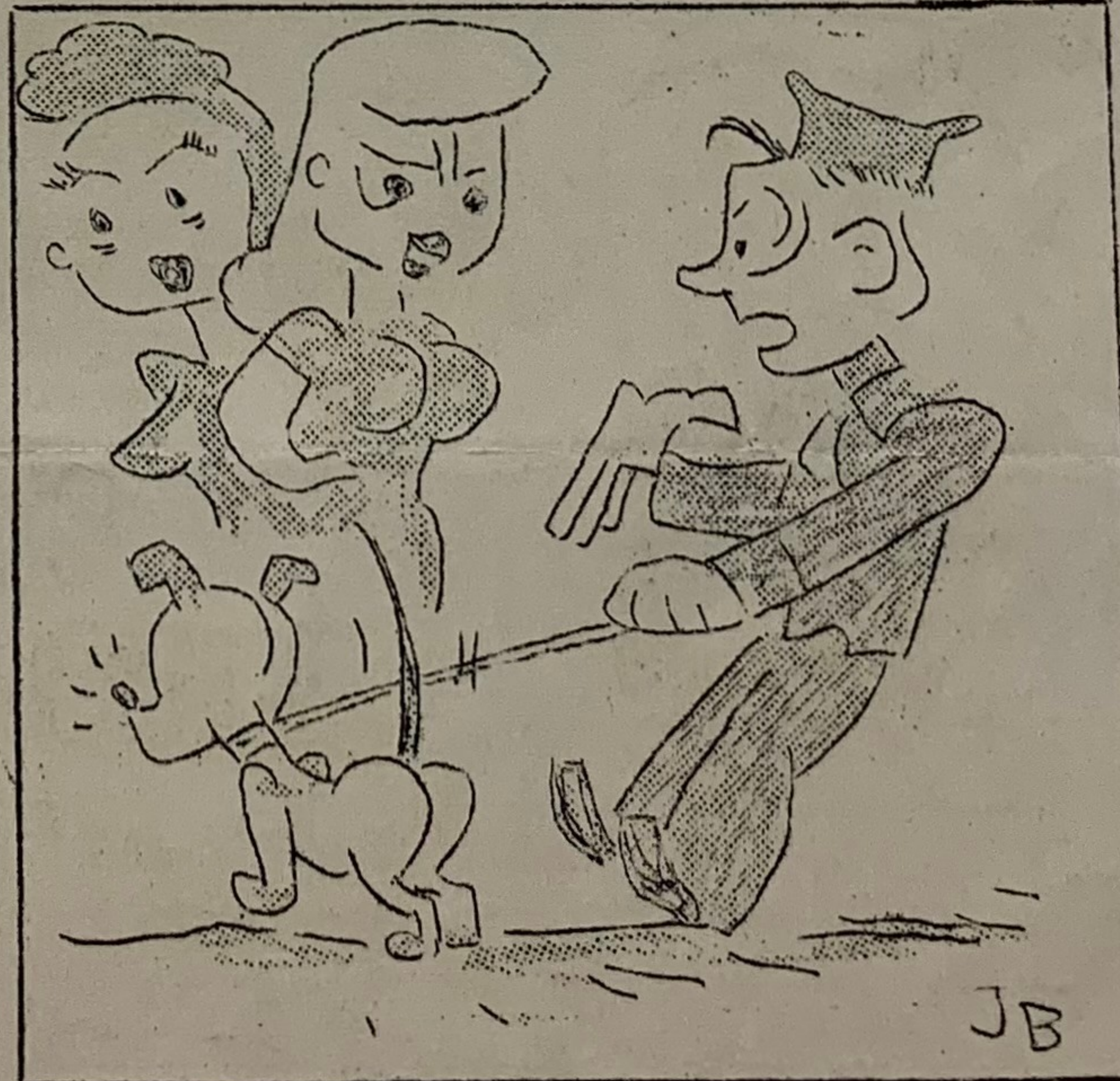
THE *Inquiring* LINE
